







Data on the impact of the cuts to foreign assistance gathered since January shows that organizations have very limited funding runways, and need to think about alternative partnerships and structures to continue their work.






Size (employees)




Impact on Civic Space

Aid cuts fundamentally undermine the ability of civil society to uphold, protect and defend human rights and to exercise their freedom of association, protected under Article 22 of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (ICCPR).



Impact on the Anti-Corruption Field

We've seen this story before- 2019 aid cuts in Central America led to increased organized crime and corruption (Small Wars Journal)



Examples of Impact on the Anti-Corruption Field

Perhaps too early to show causation in every case- but certainly a very strong correlation between US foreign assistance cuts and increased corruption
